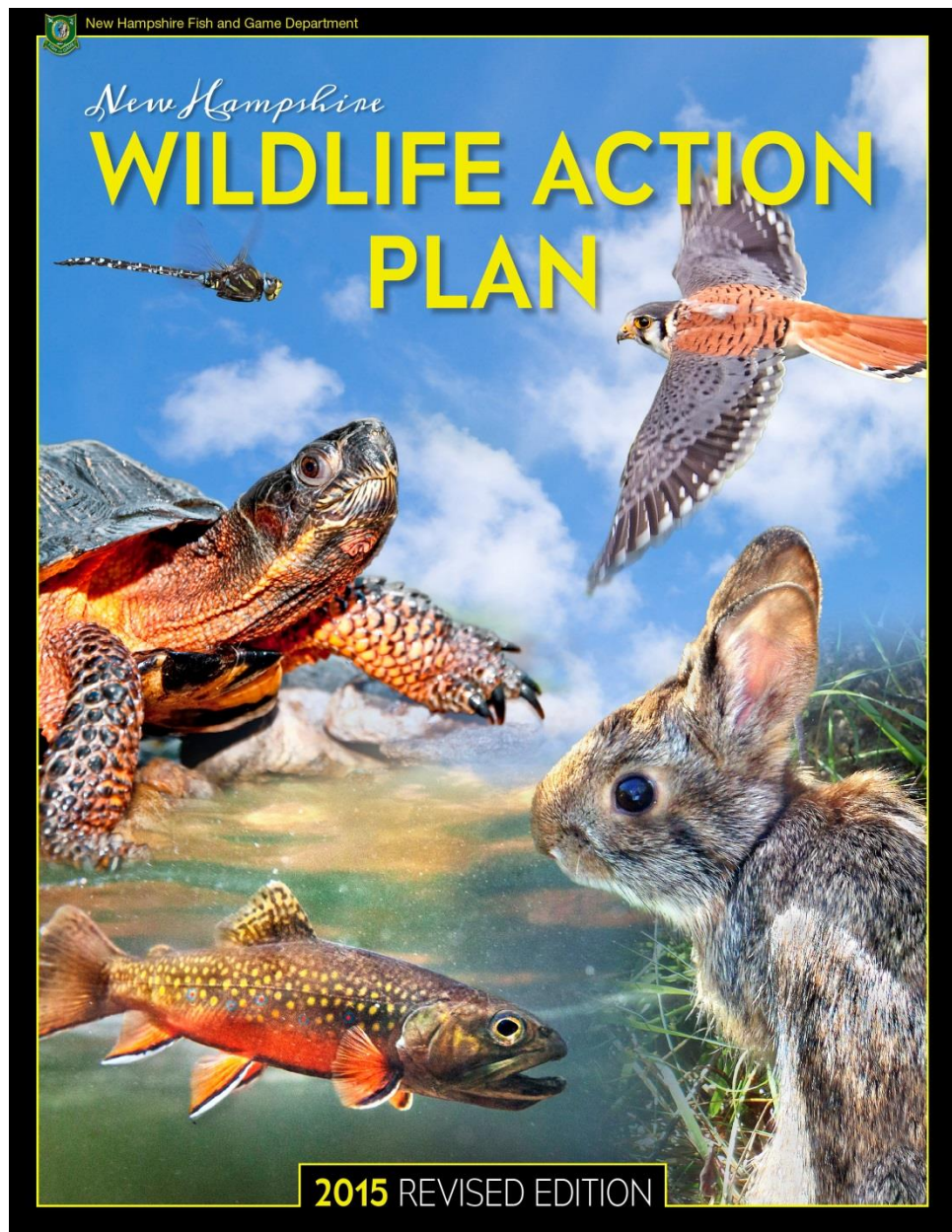

Climate Resilience

The ability of a species, habitat, or ecosystem to adjust to environmental disturbance caused by climate change by evolving, taking advantage of local opportunities, or relocating to more suitable habitat

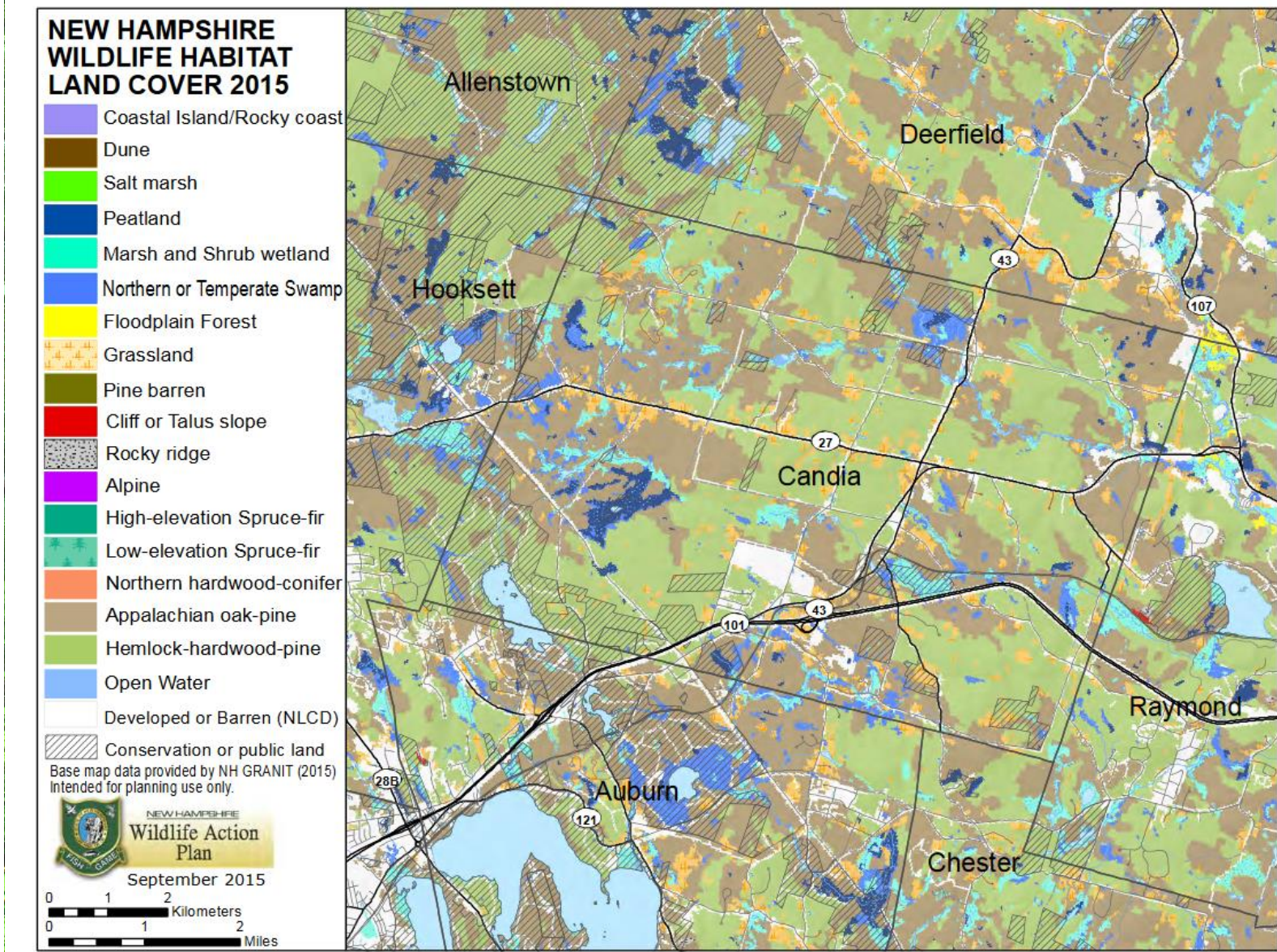

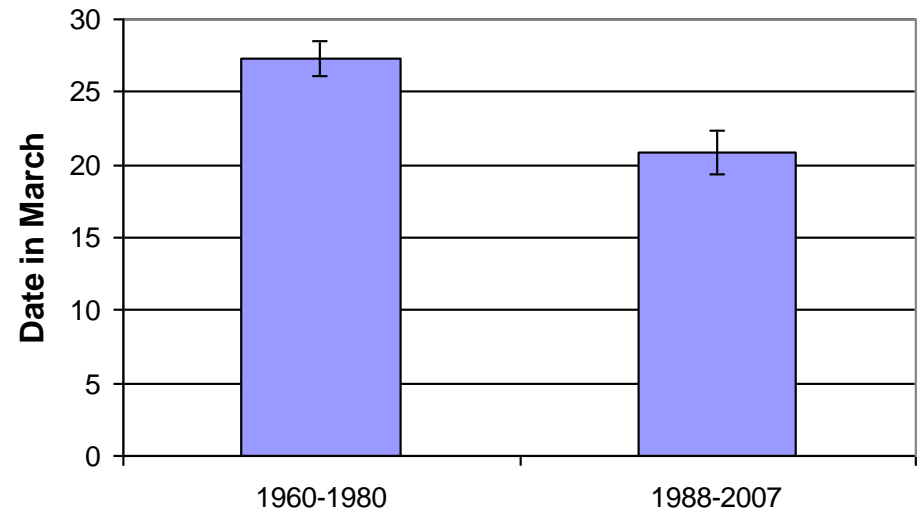
